



2016 IGF Best Practice Forum (BPF): Cybersecurity – Virtual Meeting IV

Summary Report

16 August 2016

1. The fourth virtual meeting of the 2016 IGF Best Practice Forum (BPF) on cybersecurity was held on 16 August 2016. The webex recording of the meeting can be accessed here:

2. The meeting was facilitated by Markus Kummer. The primary purpose of the call was to review progress in collecting inputs from the community from the [open call for contributions to the BPF](#). The Secretariat noted that the first soft deadline for submitting inputs was 19 August, at which point an initial compilation of the inputs received would be drafted, in consultation with stakeholders involved in the BPF, and subsequently re-circulated for further comment and additional contributions and inputs from the community. The Secretariat also noted that a deadline of 1 November had been set to post a 'Guadalajara' version of the BPF output for public comment which would remain open up until and during the 2016 IGF annual meeting from 6-9 December and BPF Cybersecurity session at the annual meeting (date and time TBD).
3. It was emphasized that there would be many points of entries into the BPF for all stakeholders, meaning that if stakeholders were not able to contribute by 19 August, they'd have many other chances to participate in the BPF during future virtual calls, on the mailing lists, and by contributing to further versions of the draft output. It was noted that in particular, contributions from National and Regional IGFs, and other relevant organizations holding meetings on cybersecurity related topics between 19 August and the annual IGF meeting in December, would be welcomed on a rolling basis.
4. The Secretariat gave a brief status update on the contributions received thus far, both via comments made on the BPF mailing list and specific answers/inputs from

the call for contributions. This update is included in **Annex I**. A number of stakeholders noted their intention to submit contributions by the 17 August soft deadline.

5. It was emphasized by participants on the call, including a representative from the Law Enforcement community, that the BPF work should not re-invent the wheel or duplicate discussions taking place in other fora. Instead, the BPF should be forward-looking and work to bring stakeholders together that may not be communicating with one another already, which is also in-line with the stated goals of the BPF which is to increase cooperation and collaboration in cybersecurity efforts.
