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INTRODUCTORY SECTION

The National Internet Governance Forum has been held in the capital of the Republic of Moldova, Chisinau, since 2020. The annual National IGF has become part of a global series of forums aimed at discussing key issues related to the development of the information society, and at consolidating the efforts of public authorities, businesses, the Internet community, and academic and professional elites to accelerate the implementation of IT solutions and create conditions for the inclusive development of Internet technologies for the public benefit. MIGF brings together participants from various countries, representing international organizations, public institutions, non-governmental and commercial organizations in the fields of ICT and mass media. In recent years, MIGF has become a key platform for national discussions about the future of the Internet in Moldova.

In 2025, the fifth Internet Governance Forum in Moldova, like the previous national forums, was held in a hybrid format, and when developing the program, proposals received from the local IG community were taken into account, as well as trends at the global and regional level. The forum became an inclusive platform for discussing key challenges – from digital trust and sustainable development to cybersecurity, responsible innovation, and the protection of users' digital rights. Special attention was given to how countries and regions can participate in shaping global rules and approaches in the digital sphere – including through initiatives such as WSIS+20 and the Global Digital Compact.

The program of the two-day national event included plenary sessions, panel discussions with the participation of leading national and foreign speakers, and side events. As part of the Open Microphone sessions, participants were able to make their comments and suggestions, as well as engage in discussions with experts and speakers on issues of interest. The nature of the event presented new challenges and made it possible to reach a wider audience – many experts and participants representing different stakeholder groups joined the fifth IGF in Moldova.

The Moldova Internet Governance Forum 2025 took place in Chisinau, in the Congress Hall of the Bristol Central Park Hotel. From 15–16 April, over 200 registered delegates from international organizations, government institutions, civil society, private sector, industry, technical community, and academia met to discuss the most important issues for the national digital environment. Some of them participated in the Forum from the conference hall, and some joined the online discussion. A number of well-known speakers and experts from Moldova, Belgium, Germany, the USA, Ukraine, Georgia, Canada, Singapore, India, Central Asian countries, and several other countries took part in MIGF events.

The Moldova Internet Governance Forum 2025 was organized in accordance with the five core IGF principles, which are:

- Open and transparent
- Inclusive
- Bottom-up
- Multi-stakeholder
- Non-commercial

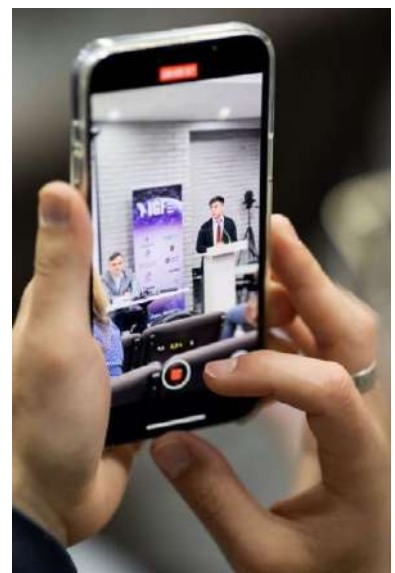
The Moldova IGF 2025 was organized by a multi-stakeholder Organizing Committee representing national public and private sectors, civil society, and the technical community. The MIGF 2025 Program Committee included representatives from four stakeholder groups, as well as representatives from ICANN and RIPE NCC. The role of a neutral secretariat of the Internet Governance Forum in Moldova has been entrusted to the Association "Comunitatea Internet" – a non-governmental organization that supports and promotes the development of an open, secure, trustworthy, and unified global Internet. In this regard, it

produces reports, implements decisions, and reports to the Organizing Committee, which reviews and validates the implementation.

The Organizing Committee invited everyone interested in discussing current Internet governance issues to participate in the national initiative. The agenda was developed using a bottom-up and multi-stakeholder approach. The Forum was supported by a number of government institutions, several international and regional organizations, as well as local supporters and volunteers.

The Moldova Internet Governance Forum has become a space for discussions on emerging digital governance issues, and for defining the wayforward. The Forum's formula has enabled a multilateral and open debate on the main challenges and opportunities presented by the development and popularization of the Internet. During the meeting, with the participation of the audience, the invited contributors were looking for new proposals and solutions, enabling a wise and responsible policy regarding the use and development of the Internet, responding to emerging needs, including in the context of growing challenges to national and regional security.





WHAT IS THE INTERNET GOVERNANCE FORUM?

The Internet Governance Forum (IGF) is a global initiative under the auspices of the UN with the idea of bringing together all interested parties to participate equally in discussions and issues relevant to Internet governance. The initiative was created in 2006 at the "World Summit on the Information Society" (WSIS) in Tunisia, as decided by the UN Secretary-General, as an open platform for discussion on Internet governance issues. The immediate motivation for this decision was the need to broaden the governance and regulation of the Internet to include the involvement of the wider community. It is important that other stakeholders such as civil society, academia, industry, and the private sector take an active part in these debates along with state representatives.

The IGF does not have a decision-making mandate, nor does it adopt binding acts, but their results may affect the procedure, which have binding effects. The IGF, by drawing its conclusions and drawing attention to topics that are relevant, can influence decision makers and thus participate in forming an official national position or public policy in the field of Internet governance.

The IGF is fully open to the participation of anyone interested in the issues of Internet stability, its security, usage, and development. The IGF is an annual event. Topics that will be discussed at the IGF can be suggested by anyone interested.

In addition to the [Global IGF](#) initiative, there are regional and sub-regional (e.g. [EuroDIG](#) – Pan-European Dialogue on Internet Governance, [SEEDIG](#) – South East European Dialogue on Internet Governance), national (e.g. Moldova IGF), and age-based initiatives (Youth IGF).

IGF initiatives, especially national and regional ones, are important because they promote communication among all stakeholders, foster the development of a culture of dialogue among different stakeholders on Internet-related issues, which helps in anticipating different perspectives and interests.

Important principles on which the IGF is based are:

- Openness and transparency (allowing all interested parties to participate in the IGF, public insight into all parts of the IGF's work);
- Inclusivity (enable active involvement of all concerned);
- Bottom-up approach (involving the public in the creation of the IGF program);
- Non-commercial - IGF is not intended for the sale of goods and services;
- Multi-stakeholder model (model of involvement of all stakeholders: academia, business sector and industry, civil society organizations and state and public administration).

MOLDOVA IGF: KEY PRINCIPLES AND MAJOR POINTS

The idea of establishing a national platform for open dialogue on Internet Governance in Moldova emerged from inspiring and successful initiatives worldwide, such as the South Eastern European Dialogue on Internet Governance (SEEDIG), the Pan-European Dialogue on Internet Governance (EuroDIG), and a plethora of national initiatives that had sprung up all over the globe under the umbrella of the United Nations Internet Governance Forum.

The Moldova Internet Governance Forum (MIGF) is a national IGF initiative for the Republic of Moldova dedicated to creating an open space for all stakeholders in order to develop an inclusive, diverse and informal dialogue on issues and problems concerning Internet governance. MIGF brings together representatives of various stakeholders to discuss global issues and topics from a national perspective, and finally to identify common priorities and make the first steps towards mutual cooperation.

Key Principles

Moldova Internet Governance Forum brings together individuals interested in national Internet Governance issues. Any interested person may join and participate in the Forum. Participation in the Internet Governance Forum is voluntary. It is organized in accordance with the main IGF principles: open and transparent, inclusive, bottom up, multi-stakeholder and non-commercial.

The main goals of MIGF are:

- to point out to various stakeholders the opportunities for involvement in Internet governance processes relevant to their business and activities, and to encourage dialogue and, if necessary, help in capacity building for better understanding of Internet-related topics;
- to empower and interest all stakeholders in Moldova to actively participate in national, and then directly or indirectly, regional and international Internet governance processes;
- to identify Internet governance topics important to Moldova.

The main objectives of the Forum are:

- to provide an open and transparent platform for all stakeholder groups;
- to bring up and discuss the Internet governance related issues;
- to give the floor to the wide community;
- to deliver the messages to policy makers.

The major directions of the Forum activity are:

- Protection of fundamental human rights and freedoms on the Internet, support for democratic process and the rule of law;
- Support for the implementation of the Internet governance with the participation of all stakeholders;
- Support for the harmonization of international regulations and local legislation;
- Support for the enhancing of Internet users' rights and capabilities;
- Promotion of the universalization of the Internet;
- Support for the Internet security and reliability, sustainability and credibility;
- Support for the formation of the decentralized approaches of the Internet governance based on social responsibility;
- Support for the introduction of innovation, new technologies and services in the Internet sector;
- Introduction of the principles of open access and freedom of user's choice;
- Facilitation of cultural and linguistic diversity in the Internet as well as support for the development of increased local content.

The work of the MIGF is based on the recommendations and best practices of the United Nations Internet Governance Forum represented by the IGF Secretariat, the Council of Europe, the Internet Society (ISOC), the Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers (ICANN) and implies the multilateral engagement model of developing the Forum agenda, organization of the Forum with minimal costs and maximum transparency, and maximum involvement of the parties. The national Internet Governance Forum of Moldova is based on the cooperation of all stakeholders, bringing together five interested groups: government, private sector, civil society, experts from the scientific, educational, and technological fields, and the representatives of international organizations. All the participants are taking part in the Forum as equal partners.

MIGF 2025 PREPARATORY ACTIVITIES

The preparatory process for the fifth National IGF began in the fall of 2024 with stakeholder meetings. The organizing team established a plan of activities to be performed before the planned event. Since then, the preparatory work of the Forum, meetings in the groups, agenda formation, and relationships with donors and supporters have started. Dialogue with government institutions and structures representing marginalized communities was also intensified. As part of the preparatory activities, an updated version of the [MIGF website](#) was launched, which was brought into line with the current agenda.

Among the first steps, the activities on updating the composition of the Organizing Committee have been initiated with the goal to connect the key stakeholders. The MIGF Organizing Committee included representatives from four stakeholder groups: government, technical community, private sector and civil society. The MIGF Program Committee included representatives from four stakeholder groups, as well as representatives from ICANN and RIPE NCC.

The role of a neutral secretariat of the Internet Governance Forum in Moldova is entrusted to the Association "Comunitatea Internet" - a non-governmental organization that supports and promotes the development of an open, secure, trustworthy, and unified global Internet. The Association is also in charge of the secretariat of the Organizing Committee. In this regard, it produces reports, implements decisions, and reports to the Committee that reviews and validates the implementation.

Members of the Organizing Committee, in particular, are responsible for:

- Selecting the central theme and sub-themes of the Forum;
- Drafting the Forum TORs and the concept notes for sessions and themes;
- Identifying and supporting session and theme moderators;
- Securing additional support and funds to hold the Forum.

The topics for the event were selected from the proposals received in a bottom-up process following a public call for inputs. In accordance with the agreed session formats, up to six contributors were envisaged for each session. Moderators were encouraged to combine interventions from speakers with interactive discussions among all session participants.

On the eve of the event, over one hundred invitations were sent to representatives of all stakeholder groups. Moldova IGF 2025 was also announced on its website, on the website and/or social platforms of the UN IGF, SEEDIG, ICANN and RIPE NCC, on social media channels of governmental and other national partners, specialized blogs and through online and print media.

In planning the event, the Organizing Team sought to involve all stakeholder groups in the preparatory and organizational processes (government, academia, technical, private and civil society). Prominent members of the local telecommunications and Internet sector have been invited to join the initiative accordingly.

As a target group, the Forum aimed to attract the local and regional Internet community, including market players, technical community and academia, supporting organizations, government officials, academics and young talents. A separate emphasis was placed on targeted activities aimed at involving underrepresented and marginalized groups.

The Organizing Committee regularly held coordination meetings from September 2024 to April 2025, especially in the preparatory phase, to discuss the strategy and make decisions regarding calls for contributions, the list of speakers, the agenda topics and partnerships. However, most communication took place in written form, via email, as quick feedback and reactions were needed to ensure deadlines were being followed. Regarding the Organizing Team, most of the preparatory meetings traditionally took place via Microsoft Teams or Zoom, as they had to happen more often. Regular meetings were needed in

order to ensure that the calendar was being followed, that all stakeholder groups were consulted, and that all communication with speakers, participants and partners was being carried out in a timely, transparent and efficient manner. All in-person and online meetings have been documented through note-taking and the sharing of meeting notes on the Organizing Team meetings.

Representatives of institutional and international partners of the Moldova IGF took the floor at the opening of the event, alongside national partner organizations, key government institutions, and members of the MIGF Organizing Committee. Some international speakers joined online, while others traveled to Chişinău to take part in discussions on Moldova’s Internet governance agenda and related developments. The opening of MIGF 2025 included live interventions from Geneva, Brussels, and New York.

In his welcoming address, **Alexei Marciuc, Chair of the Comunitatea Internet Association and MIGF Coordinator**, emphasized the forum’s core mission: “The main goal of this platform is to unite all stakeholders in an open dialogue on the most pressing Internet governance issues.” He outlined the comprehensive MIGF 2025 agenda, which focuses on themes such as digital trust and sustainable development, cooperation, online information integrity, responsible innovation, digital rights, and cybersecurity amid geopolitical uncertainty.

“Modern technologies open up broad opportunities to address urgent challenges,” Alexei Marciuc noted. “But they also carry serious risks – from the spread of disinformation to deepening digital inequality. The younger generation, relying on digital platforms for both information and social interaction, is especially vulnerable.” He added that the forum is not only a space for discussion, but a platform for developing practical recommendations to help shape Moldova’s digital policy in the years to come.

Representing the Moldovan Parliament, MP Victor Spînu highlighted the evolving role of the Internet as a critical part of daily life and democratic governance: “We live in an era where the Internet is no longer a

luxury—it’s a vital component of democracy, the economy, and everyday life.” He stressed that Internet governance must be a co-responsible, inclusive process, not a top-down imposition: “It’s about building clear rules based on trust, openness, and social responsibility. About ensuring free access to information, promoting local content, protecting cultural diversity, and encouraging innovation in a fair and sustainable way.”

Victor Spînu described MIGF as a “concrete step” toward building a collaborative digital future for Moldova and expressed appreciation to the organizing team for promoting “an open, safe, and trustworthy Internet.” According to the MP, forums like the Moldova IGF help develop balanced approaches that protect users’ rights while also fostering innovation. Dialogue with the technical community and civil society enables the formation of a flexible, resilient digital policy for the country.

Sergiu Gaibu, Director of the National Regulatory Agency for Electronic Communications and Information Technology (ANRCETI), underscored the need for adaptation and improved digital literacy in the face of rapidly evolving technologies such as 5G and artificial intelligence. He announced ongoing feasibility studies, supported by the EU and World Bank, aimed at connecting Moldovan villages to fiber-optic Internet.

The ANRCETI Director reiterated the national regulator’s commitment to actively contributing to the development of state digital policy that ensures an open and secure Internet aligned with both international trends and Moldova’s national digital development priorities. He emphasized ANRCETI’s strategic role in the development and regulation of Moldova’s electronic communications and IT sector.

“Public institutions must integrate digital components into their work and cooperate with each other, civil society, and international partners to address the challenges of the digital environment—such as cybersecurity, data protection, and infrastructure resilience. Today’s forum is an example of these efforts. In the digital era, Internet access is no longer a luxury but a necessity, and digital inclusion is becoming a priority for both Moldova and Europe,” Sergiu Gaibu said.

From the Prime Minister’s Office, Anatolie Golovco, cybersecurity expert, highlighted the delicate balance that underpins the Internet: “All the benefits we’ve enjoyed over the past 20–30 years are the result of a very fine balance in Internet governance.” He reminded participants that governments are only part of a broader network of actors and that effective policy must be grounded in technical understanding.

Anja Gengo from the United Nations IGF Secretariat praised the Moldovan community’s commitment: “Moldova’s priorities—digital trust, sustainable development, and human rights—are shared global imperatives.” She referenced the ongoing WSIS+20 process and invited Moldovan stakeholders to continue contributing to the global agenda: “Your discussions provide valuable input to international efforts, ensuring digital governance remains truly multistakeholder.”

David Frautschy Heredia, Senior Director for European Government and Regulatory Affairs at the Internet Society (ISOC), spoke about the Internet’s transformative power: “The success of the Internet comes from its core principles—openness, collaboration, and innovation.” He emphasized the need for measurable, technology-neutral commitments and reaffirmed ISOC’s support for making the IGF a permanent and sustainably funded platform.

Mikhail Anisimov, Head of Global Stakeholder Engagement for Eastern Europe and Central Asia at the Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers (ICANN), acknowledged Moldova as a long-time supporter of multistakeholder governance and reiterated ICANN’s commitment to supporting local partners in maintaining the Internet’s technical stability.

Oleksiy Semenyaka, Community Development Officer and Technical Advisor for the Réseaux IP Européens Network Coordination Centre (RIPE NCC), stressed the importance of involving non-technical communities in Internet governance: “The Internet is fragile, and that’s why we need inclusive dialogue.

Everyone in this room is important.” He thanked all those present in the conference room and joining online, expressing confidence that the two days of discussion would be productive and make a meaningful contribution to the development of the digital agenda – nationally, regionally, and globally.





DAY 1 - Keynote Speech

From the Summit of the Future to WSIS+ 20: The Global Dialogue on Digital Governance and Multistakeholder Cooperation and Its National-Level Impact

During the opening of MIGF 2025, **Veni Markovski, Vice President for Government Engagement – United Nations NY and Interim Head of Government and Intergovernmental Organization Engagement at the Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers (ICANN)**, addressed the audience of the national event.

Veni Markovski delivered a keynote address titled “*From the Summit of the Future to WSIS+20: The Global Dialogue on Digital Governance and Multistakeholder Cooperation and Its National-Level Impact.*” Marking the 20-year milestone of the [World Summit on the Information Society \(WSIS+ 20\)](#) and as we enter the implementation phase of the [Global Digital Compact \(GDC\)](#), adopted at the [2024 UN Summit of the Future](#), the keynote speech focused on assessing progress and articulating a forward-looking vision for digital governance at both the global and national levels. It provided a strategic platform to explore how multistakeholder cooperation can drive sustainable digital development and build resilient digital governance frameworks. Crucially, this highlighted the importance of aligning local actions with global frameworks and effectively reflecting regional and national perspectives in the development of global digital policy, underscoring the value of the multistakeholder model and the crucial role of substantive participation from governments, international organizations, the private sector, civil society, the technical community, and academia.

Veni Markovski emphasized that participation in global digital initiatives enables countries and regions not only to adapt to worldwide trends, but also to contribute to the creation of a sustainable, inclusive, and secure digital environment. He noted that national events such as the Moldova IGF play a key role in fostering multilateral dialogue and knowledge sharing, helping to develop coordinated approaches to digital policy that

reflect both local specificities and global challenges. Following the keynote address, a discussion session took place, featuring international stakeholders and Moldovan government officials.



DAY 1 - Session 1

Strategic Frameworks and Partnerships for a Trusted Digital Future: A Roadmap for Responsible and Sustainable Digital Development

The high-level session titled "*Strategic Frameworks and Partnerships for a Trusted Digital Future: A Roadmap for Responsible and Sustainable Digital Development*" focused on cross-sectoral collaboration to build trust and sustainability in Moldova's digital transformation. Speakers emphasized the challenges and opportunities arising from deep integration of digital technologies into all aspects of life and the critical importance of fostering partnerships to ensure security, data protection, and inclusivity.

Sergiu Gaibu, Director of the National Regulatory Agency for Electronic Communications and Information Technology (ANRCETI) and Chairman of the ANRCETI Administrative Board, opened by highlighting ongoing efforts to improve internet accessibility, particularly in rural and underserved areas. He noted the agency's collaborative approach, which includes discussions with international partners such as the World Bank and the European Union, to conduct feasibility studies for expanding fiber-optic infrastructure to remote Moldovan villages.

According to Sergiu Gaibu, around 100 villages remain without any internet connectivity ("white zones"), and approximately 400 have insufficient service that does not meet modern standards. He emphasized that this infrastructure gap is a fundamental barrier to digital inclusion, requiring coordinated public and private investment. "This will serve as a solid foundation for closing the digital divide and becoming a fully integrated member of the European digital family," he said.

Head of the national regulator further noted the recent adoption of the new Law on electronic communications by Moldova's Parliament, which was developed through extensive consultation with government agencies, law enforcement, the Ministry of Labor and Social Protection, the Ministry of Economic Development and Digitalization, and the private sector. He underlined that the new legal framework aligns with the European Union's regulatory standards, reflecting cooperation to enhance transparency, security, and inclusion in the communications sector.

Sergiu Gaibu stressed the importance of recognizing electronic communications as a public utility service to better support vulnerable populations and ensure affordable access countrywide. He concluded by emphasizing the agency's strategic role in fostering digital policy consistent with Moldova's national priorities and international trends.

Vitalie Tarlev, Digitalisation Adviser in the Economic Council to the Prime Minister, provided a business perspective on Moldova's digital ecosystem. He underlined the significance of reliable internet access as a critical economic asset, particularly for micro, small, and medium enterprises (MSMEs), which face challenges related not only to connectivity but also to foundational digital services such as secure authentication and reliable online payment systems.

Vitalie Tarlev noted that while Moldova benefits from broad digital literacy across social groups, persistent issues of uneven access and trust hinder full participation. He observed that public discourse often tends to focus on cybersecurity threats rather than on the positive economic value of digital innovation. Highlighting the need for society to shift towards recognizing the enabling role of digital technologies, he stressed Moldova's openness to innovation and the importance of seizing opportunities for digital economic growth despite various region-specific challenges.

Oleksiy Semenyaka, Community Development Officer and Technical Advisor for the Réseaux IP Européens Network Coordination Centre (RIPE NCC), addressed the technical foundations of internet infrastructure and governance. He described RIPE NCC's role as the regional Internet registry managing critical IP resources and supporting the stability and security of the internet infrastructure across multiple countries, including Moldova.

The RIPE NCC representative emphasized the fragility and complexity of the internet, noting that disruptions or cyberattacks in one region can have wider implications. He urged Moldovan stakeholders to increase

engagement with European and global internet governance initiatives, stressing that Moldova's participation must be elevated to a higher strategic level to match its status as a European country.

He also highlighted RIPE NCC's programs for capacity building and provided an invitation for Moldovan experts to join ongoing training and community activities aimed at strengthening internet resilience and cooperation. Oleksiy Semenyaka reinforced the message that available platforms, tools, and best practices already exist and need to be utilized proactively to address infrastructure and security challenges.

Anatolie Golovco, Consultant on Cybersecurity and Digital Transformation in the Prime Minister's Office, expanded on Moldova's technological prospects, emphasizing the shift from electronic to photonic communications as a key future development. He noted collaborative research with Japanese partners and underscored the importance of energy efficiency and innovation at the infrastructural level. Expert described ongoing efforts to enhance optical networks, revitalize academic expertise, and explore quantum communications as foundational to the country's long-term digital trajectory.

Prime Minister's Office representative also highlighted cybersecurity challenges related to internet exchange points and the importance of establishing a public, non-commercial internet exchange to improve network stability. Anatolie Golovco referenced government investment in critical infrastructure such as root DNS mirrors supplied by private providers, which contribute to the country's internet resilience.

Recognizing the complex role of content regulation in the digital space, especially during political campaigns, he called for well-developed mechanisms to promptly address illegal online activities while balancing freedom of expression. Finally, he mentioned recent government initiatives on trust services legislation aimed at strengthening citizens' confidence in digital systems and enhancing interoperability with European frameworks.

Tattu Mambetalieva, Chair at the Central Asian Internet Governance Forum (CAIGF), contributed a regional perspective, noting the evolution and broadening of internet governance agendas over the past decade. She emphasized the importance of clearly defining the scope of internet governance amid overlapping forums to avoid duplication and maintain focus on core governance challenges.

Chair of CAIGF highlighted efforts in Central Asia to build a regional digital ecosystem capable of responding effectively to global challenges by facilitating cooperation among business, civil society, and government actors. The upcoming subregional training school on internet governance, aimed at enhancing stakeholder knowledge and influence, was presented as a model for capacity building.

She stressed the critical need for international and regional alignment in regulatory approaches, particularly around emerging technologies like artificial intelligence, with a focus on ethical standards for development and use that protect human rights. Cyber resilience and infrastructure sustainability were identified as fundamental pillars of trust, and enhancing data protection and transparency mechanisms across sectors was encouraged.

According to Tattu Mambetalieva, fostering multistakeholder partnerships and continuous skill development remain essential for addressing the rapid pace of technological change and ensuring equal access regionally. She invited Moldovan organizers to collaborate on training initiatives to strengthen cross-regional ties and knowledge exchange.

Mikhail Anisimov, Head of Global Stakeholder Engagement for Eastern Europe and Central Asia at ICANN, underscored Moldova's active role in internet governance and highlighted the growing specialization within the field. He praised the efforts to establish stakeholders engagement, encouraging continued expansion of capacity building to include various technical and policy issues. Mikhail Anisimov emphasized the distinction between technical internet governance and broader social issues such as human rights and artificial intelligence, advocating for multidisciplinary approaches to address complex governance challenges in an interconnected digital environment.

This session showcased a comprehensive roadmap for fostering a trusted digital future in Moldova through strategic partnerships among government agencies, private sector, civil society, and international organizations. Speakers highlighted priorities including expanding infrastructure, particularly in underserved areas, advancing regulatory alignment with European standards, enhancing cybersecurity and network resilience, and promoting digital inclusion with attention to vulnerable groups.

The role of education, capacity building, and multistakeholder coordination was emphasized as essential to closing the digital divide and ensuring that innovations contribute positively to economic growth, social inclusion, and sustainable development. Emerging technologies such as photonics, quantum communication, and artificial intelligence were presented as opportunities requiring careful governance frameworks based on ethical principles and trust.

The session reinforced Moldova's commitment to integrating national efforts within broader regional and global digital governance mechanisms, positioning the country as an active and forward-looking participant in shaping a secure, inclusive, and sustainable digital ecosystem.

Toward a Trustworthy Online Information Environment: Strengthening Digital Integrity in Moldova

The session on “*Toward a Trustworthy Online Information Environment: Strengthening Digital Integrity in Moldova*” focused on the growing challenges posed by misinformation and disinformation, which undermine public trust, polarize societies, and threaten democratic values. Speakers discussed strategic

pathways for fostering an inclusive, multistakeholder governance approach to bolster information integrity and societal resilience in Moldova's digital ecosystem.

Dumitru Tira, CEO of Realitatea Media Group and expert in media and public communication, opened by emphasizing the importance of the session's multilingual format and its focus on digital integrity amid the turbulent regional and global context. He highlighted the relevance of addressing misinformation as a key factor for social cohesion.

Veronica Maevschi, Issues Affecting Children Program Director at the International Centre La Strada Moldova, addressed the specific risks faced by children and adolescents in the digital environment. She underscored that while children are active digital participants, their critical thinking is still developing, making them vulnerable to harmful content, including sexually explicit material and manipulative online interactions such as those involving AI chatbots.

Expert presented alarming data from a 2024 national study showing that one in five Moldovan children inadvertently encountered harmful content online, with many exposed to sexual content via messaging platforms. She described La Strada's ongoing efforts, including digital literacy programs, pedagogical training, parental guidance seminars, and partnerships with government ministries to create safe online spaces for children. The organization also operates siguronline.md — a platform providing resources and psychological support for children facing online risks.

She stressed the need for clear and effective regulations obligating platforms to protect children from harmful content and called for proactive education to build young people's resilience. Importantly, Veronica Maevschi highlighted youth participation as essential to shaping digital governance aligned with their perspectives and needs.

Antanina Maslyka, Regional Director for Europe at ARTICLE 19, provided a human rights perspective on digital information governance. She highlighted the critical role of AI and emerging technologies in shaping information flows and emphasized that Moldova's legislative framework must integrate European Union standards to safeguard information integrity and human rights.

Expert stressed the need for transparency and accountability mechanisms in AI deployment and digital content moderation. She pointed to gaps in Moldova's regulatory environment, such as the lack of provisions for complaints and impact assessments related to AI uses. She underscored the essential role of civil society in legislative transposition processes and encouraged multistakeholder engagement to ensure just and effective regulation.

Antanina Maslyka also referenced international financial initiatives supporting internet governance and AI development, highlighting the importance of ensuring that such investments do not undermine human rights.

Anastasiya Zhyrmon, Policy Manager for Eastern Europe and Central Asia at Access Now, focused on combating disinformation and protecting digital rights in the region. She pointed to increasing state and non-state efforts to weaponize misinformation, particularly Russian propaganda campaigns impacting Moldova, Ukraine, Georgia, and Central Asia.

Expert underscored the complexities of content moderation and the risks of overreach, calling for rights-respecting frameworks that balance countering disinformation with freedom of expression. She highlighted the need for stronger protections against online harassment and emphasized transparent content policies and collaboration with civil society to monitor platform accountability.

Regarding the challenge of TikTok and similar platforms, Anastasiya Zhyrmon advised against banning as an effective solution, noting that nuanced, context-sensitive approaches and platform cooperation are preferable.

Ivan Sveatcenko, journalist and host of the author's project on YouTube, provided a personal perspective on the information online landscape, reflecting on the overwhelming volume of content and uncertainties introduced by technologies like artificial intelligence. He observed how digital information shapes social moods and democratic processes, acknowledging the disruptive potential of misinformation campaigns and the difficulty of countering bot-driven distortions.

Ivan Sveatcenko advocated for cultivating information hygiene and critical thinking to preserve democratic values amid rapid technological change.

Diana Okremova, Director at Legal Media Center, Kazakhstan, shared insights from Kazakhstan's experience combating disinformation. She described the state's paternalistic approach relying heavily on legislative restrictions, which often results in uneven enforcement and political misuse of laws against journalists and activists.

Expert highlighted four key areas vulnerable to disinformation in Kazakhstan: health (notably vaccine misinformation), economic scams, social tensions among ethnic groups, and political destabilization influenced by foreign propaganda. She emphasized the deficiency of comprehensive media literacy education and a coherent national strategy to counter misinformation. She called for a balanced approach combining regulation, civil society engagement, and citizen empowerment.

In discussion, Diana Okremova noted that internal and external sources both contribute to disinformation flows, with sensitive topics like relations with Russia being particularly affected. She further highlighted the low level of critical thinking skills among the general public and the emotional spread of false information through social media channels.

The session included an engaging discussion highlighting concerns raised by participants regarding the impact of digital environments on children. One participant emphasized the pervasive presence of mobile devices among youth, noting the exposure to harmful content and behaviors. Speaking from the perspective of a lawyer and economist, he stressed the urgent need for the state to prioritize comprehensive education and awareness programs aimed at preventing crimes and unacceptable conduct online.

He urged that the valuable insights from the children-focused report be formally communicated to both Parliament and the Government, accompanied by clear recommendations to ensure children receive positive information and prevent unfortunate incidents. He suggested that this conference could culminate in a detailed report or information note, underscoring the seriousness of youth challenges in the digital sphere.

The session highlighted the multifaceted challenges faced by Moldova and other countries in the region in creating a trustworthy online information environment, including the proliferation of misinformation, AI-driven content manipulation, and the protection of vulnerable groups such as children. Speakers emphasized the necessity of a coordinated, multistakeholder approach involving government, civil society, media, technical communities, and youth.

Key priorities identified included:

- Developing and enforcing clear, effective regulations aligned with European standards to promote transparency, accountability, and digital platform responsibility.

- Strengthening media literacy education and digital resilience, particularly targeting vulnerable groups, including children and youth.
- Enhancing cooperation across sectors and borders to address disinformation and its societal impacts.
- Supporting human-centered governance frameworks that respect human rights while tackling emerging technological risks.
- Recognizing the important role of civil society and other stakeholder groups, the participation of youth, and international collaboration in shaping digital integrity policies.

The session reinforced the critical importance of sustained dialogue, education, and inclusive policymaking to safeguard democratic discourse and foster a trusted, ethical digital ecosystem in Moldova and beyond.

Fundamental Rights and Freedoms in the Era of Digital Innovation: Constitutional Guarantees and Challenges of the Evolving Digital Order

The session gathered representatives from the Parliament, Constitutional Court, academic community, and international experts to discuss the pressing challenges and opportunities in protecting fundamental rights amid Moldova's ongoing digital transformation.

Experts highlighted how digitalization reshapes governance models and social relations, generating new digital rights and obligations while revealing significant regulatory gaps. The discussion underscored the dynamic and continuous nature of digital transformation, driven by emerging technologies such as artificial intelligence, big data, and complex digital ecosystems. These advances require adaptive constitutional guarantees to safeguard human rights in a rapidly evolving digital order.

Key themes included:

- Bridging the digital divide: Recognizing persistent inequalities affecting marginalized, rural, and vulnerable populations, participants stressed the necessity of inclusive policies and programs—both public and private—to ensure universal, non-discriminatory access to digital resources, thereby enabling full realization of constitutional rights.

- **Digital sovereignty:** The importance of safeguarding the state’s independence in managing digital infrastructure and data was emphasized, considering the risks posed by foreign access and the dominant influence of large transnational digital platforms on information flows and digital rights.
- **Legal and constitutional adaptation:** Experts discussed the challenges of updating constitutional frameworks and legislative instruments to comprehensively cover digital rights, data protection, and digital governance while addressing existing normative fragmentation and contradictions.
- **Balancing individual rights and state interests:** The session explored the delicate balance between protecting human rights and enabling state functions, especially in contexts such as law enforcement and election periods, advocating for equitable application and oversight.
- **European integration and legal harmonization:** Moldova’s commitments under EU accession were examined as a strategic driver for advancing digital governance aligned with European standards, including the development of clear normative frameworks for digital rights and the digital economy.
- **Technological challenges and innovations:** The transformative impact of artificial intelligence, data analytics, and virtual infrastructures was acknowledged, alongside concerns about insufficient regulatory mechanisms governing emerging technologies.
- **Multistakeholder engagement:** The role of academia, civil society, and international cooperation was emphasized to foster inclusive policymaking and capacity building in digital rights protections.

Highlights from the session:

- Digital ecosystems rely on complex data aggregation and management that necessitate legal regulation to protect citizens’ rights amid vast data flows and technological innovation.
- Digital sovereignty is a core concern, as dependence on external digital infrastructure and corporate platforms can undermine state independence and citizens’ rights.
- Constitutional protection of digital rights remains fragmented and incomplete; there is a pressing need for integrated and coherent legal frameworks that respect fundamental freedoms in the digital age.
- Comparative examples from European jurisdictions illustrated efforts to balance law enforcement mandates with human rights protections, underscoring the crucial role of oversight and proportionality.
- The digital divide remains a barrier not only to economic development but to the exercise of rights, calling for sustained efforts to expand digital literacy and infrastructure access.

In conclusion, the session reinforced the imperative of a comprehensive, constitutionally grounded approach to digital governance that upholds fundamental rights and freedoms while fostering Moldova’s technological and economic progress. It called for strengthened cooperation among government institutions, the judiciary, academia, civil society, and international partners to build resilient and inclusive legal frameworks responsive to the evolving digital environment.





DAY 1 - Session 4

Integrated Digital Safety: Building a Culture of Institutional Resilience in a Turbulent Digital Landscape

The session convened leading technical and policy experts in digital security with extensive experience supporting high-risk communities across Eastern Europe and Eurasia. It addressed the critical importance of cybersecurity as an integral component of sustainable development in governments, businesses, and civil society, highlighting the escalating threats faced by activists, media, and vulnerable organizations in a rapidly evolving digital environment.

Participants emphasized that digital security cannot be effectively managed through isolated rules or technologies alone. Instead, a holistic and integrated approach is necessary—recognizing not only technical solutions but also physical, psychosocial, and legal dimensions of security. Stress, burnout, and mental health significantly affect individuals' capacity to adhere to best cybersecurity practices, highlighting the human factor in digital resilience.

A practical example discussed involved individuals crossing multiple national borders in conflict contexts, facing scrutiny of their encrypted devices, new tech gadgets, and social media usage by authorities, which raises unique security and privacy challenges.

The experts outlined the multiple layers of integrated safety, starting with:

- **Physical security:** Ensuring safety of offices, devices, and data infrastructure against attacks or disruptions, including contingency planning for emergencies such as armed conflicts.
- **Psychosocial security:** Addressing mental health and stress management to sustain sound decision-making and reduce risky behaviors that undermine security protocols.
- **Digital security:** Fostering secure digital practices, including data encryption, proper management of digital identities, and awareness of digital hygiene tailored to the contextual legal environments.
- **Legal security:** Understanding and navigating regulatory frameworks to ensure compliance, data protection, and managing legal liabilities.

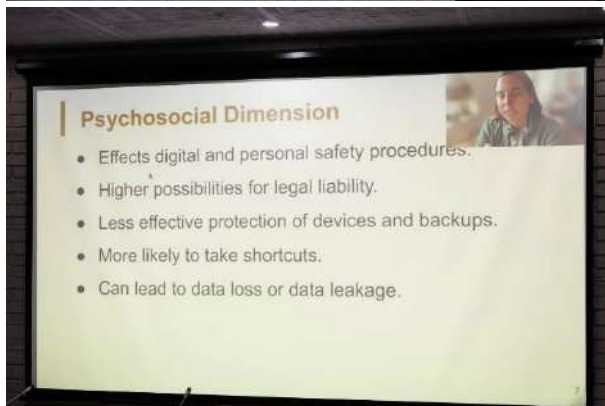
Challenges raised included growing cyber risks such as social engineering, AI-enabled phishing attacks, insider threats, and vulnerabilities introduced by cloud data management, especially given shrinking financial support for civil society organizations in the region.

Cross-border data flows and transit were identified as areas needing stronger regulatory clarity and enforcement, with digital hygiene itself potentially attracting unwanted scrutiny in some countries. The diversity of digital ecosystems requires coordinated and context-sensitive security frameworks, underscored by both formal regulations and community norms.

Audience engagement raised concerns about electronic surveillance fears among activists and vulnerable groups. Experts reassured that broad-scale mass surveillance is constrained by resource limitations and legal safeguards, although abuses have occurred historically. They emphasized the importance of transparency, oversight mechanisms, and ongoing vigilance in balancing security and privacy.

Speakers also highlighted the necessity of developing a shared digital security culture encompassing individuals, families, institutions, and states. This culture relies on common values, community standards, and user empowerment through education and trusted resources. The establishment of such a culture is a protective factor that can substantially mitigate risks and strengthen institutional resilience.

In conclusion, the session affirmed that building a resilient digital safety ecosystem requires integrated strategies that encompass technical, human, and regulatory elements. Sustainable digital security in turbulent environments depends on investing in physical and psychosocial well-being, fostering legal awareness, and cultivating community-driven digital norms alongside robust technical safeguards. Strong collaboration among stakeholders at all levels is essential to confronting emerging threats and ensuring the long-term stability of democratic processes and civil liberties in the region.





DAY 1 - Closing session

Conclusions and Final Remarks



The main day of the fifth National Internet Governance Forum concluded with a closing session attended by representatives of international and national MIGF partners, members of the Organizing Committee, and participants and contributors to the event. During the session, stakeholders had the opportunity to share their reflections, comments, and recommendations in light of the Forum's outcomes.

Participants and contributors emphasized the significance of strengthening the multistakeholder approach, which ensures legitimacy, accountability, representation, and effectiveness when addressing complex digital challenges. There was broad support for securing a continuous mandate for the Internet Governance Forum, underlining its ongoing role as a key platform for discussing digital governance issues at the national, subregional, regional, and global levels.

Oleksiy Semenyaka, Community Development Officer and Technical Advisor at the Réseaux IP Européens Network Coordination Centre (RIPE NCC), observed:

“This year, the event left a truly positive impression on me. I have participated in previous forums in Moldova and can see tremendous progress. It was inspiring to see people—from high-level officials to everyday users—speaking openly, posing questions, and engaging in discussions on digital policy without reading from a script. The IGF is not necessarily about making final decisions here and now; it is about open dialogue, understanding one another, and fostering communication. I am certain this goal was achieved this year. I congratulate our Moldovan partners for this: it was interesting, it was intense, it was important—and I hope we will continue in this spirit.”

Mikhail Anisimov, Head of Global Stakeholder Engagement for Eastern Europe and Central Asia at ICANN, highlighted:

“We live in very dynamic times, and this year will bring a great number of discussions and developments in which we will play an active part. In particular, it is expected that by the end of the year, the global mandate for the Internet Governance Forum will be defined. I sincerely wish the Moldovan community and

its partners to continue effective coordination at the national level and to remain active participants in both regional and global digital agendas.”

Joanna Szymańska, Head of Programmes and Strategy for Europe at ARTICLE 19, remarked:

“On behalf of ARTICLE 19, I would like to highlight that Moldova stands at an important juncture in its digital transformation—one that involves adaptation to technological progress and core values of human rights and the rule of law. Today’s discussions underscored the urgency of securing digital inclusivity, human rights-based approaches, access to digital resources, and reducing the risk of exclusion and digital divides. The European legal framework provides a valuable model for transparency, accountability, and safety that Moldova can build upon. Ensuring constitutional rights in the context of digitalization and artificial intelligence is critical, and this Forum demonstrated the strength of the multistakeholder model by bringing together legal experts, government, academia, and civil society. Moving forward, there must continue to be a strong focus on inclusivity, transparency, and the protection of digital rights for all. Moldova has the necessary resources and platform to support this dialogue, particularly as it faces challenges from actors targeting the destabilization of democratic processes. Our commitment to digital rights—and to partnership with Moldova—remains steadfast.”

Azamat Burzhuev, Senior Public Policy Manager, Eastern Europe & Central Asia, TikTok, commented:

“Many topical and important issues have been raised today regarding the digital agenda. We hope that Internet governance always finds the right balance between public expectations and the state’s vision. That is why we support multistakeholder platforms like the Moldova Internet Governance Forum and see it as an effective space for dialogue and exchange among all stakeholders.”

Andrei Rusnac, Information Security Expert and Co-founder of the Comunitatea Internet Association, noted:

“The Internet Governance Forum in Moldova has, for five years now, provided a unique national platform for the discussion of the most pressing digital challenges. Achieving balance in the digital environment is a complex task that requires active participation from all interested actors. MIGF has become an incubator for innovation and capacity building, promoting inclusivity and transparent dialogue among all stakeholders.”

Ameen Ali, Researcher at the Technical University of Moldova, expressed gratitude to organizers and partners, stated:

“This conference not only highlights the level of digital advancement in Moldova but also shows how mature and engaged the cyber community is. Moldovan youth remain attuned to the ongoing technological developments, keeping pace with leading countries. This was my first time at MIGF, but certainly not the last.”

Anatolie Golovco, Expert on Cybersecurity and Digital Transformation, representative of the Office of the Prime Minister, Government of the Republic of Moldova, noted:

“The sessions of MIGF 2025 highlighted the critical importance of diverse multistakeholder dialogue in shaping and advancing our digital agenda. This forum once again demonstrated its effectiveness as a platform that enables us to hear a wide array of perspectives and innovative ideas. Such engagement is not only valuable but essential—it directly informs and enriches the government digital policies, ensuring they reflect the shared insights and forward-thinking solutions discussed here.”

As an official part of the MIGF 2025 program, Moldova marked its inaugural Universal Acceptance (UA) Day on April 16, 2025, reinforcing its commitment to an accessible, multilingual, and inclusive digital environment. Held in Chişinău with both onsite and remote participation, the side event convened actors from government, the technical and academic communities, civil society, and the private sector. The central theme was Universal Acceptance—a core technical requirement and policy priority enabling all valid domain names and email addresses, regardless of script, language, or length, to be equally recognized and supported across all internet-enabled systems, applications, and devices.

Opening remarks from national and international partners emphasized the urgency of advancing a UA-ready digital landscape in Moldova. Speakers highlighted how linguistic and cultural diversity presents both a challenge and an opportunity for digital inclusion.

National authorities, including the Prime Minister's Office and the Moldovan e-Governance Agency, reaffirmed their dedication to modernizing public services and ensuring equitable digital access, noting that Universal Acceptance is “essential for guaranteeing online access for all segments of the population.” The socioeconomic benefits of a multilingual and inclusive internet, as well as the imperative for inclusive-by-design technologies, were stressed.

Representatives of global actors, including ICANN and UASG, praised Moldova’s commitment and underscored how UA is fundamental for digital inclusion and economic growth. The importance of UA was described as both a technical necessity and an enabler of digital equality and cultural representation.

A core feature of the day was a hands-on programming workshop led by recognized UA experts. Participants from government, academia, and the private sector were trained in UA-compliant application development using Java, JavaScript, and Python. The training emphasized practical implementation strategies, and over 30 participants—both onsite and remote—received certificates upon successful completion.

The event welcomed active engagement from **Moldova’s e-Governance Agency, the Prime Minister’s Office, the Information Technology and Cybersecurity Service (STISC), the Center for Information Technologies in Finance (CTIF), the Technical University, the Academy of Economic Studies of Moldova, and private sector IT companies**. Sessions were livestreamed, and resources remain available for ongoing capacity building.

Moldova's first Universal Acceptance Day served as a practical catalyst for closing the digital divide and fostering a multilingual internet ecosystem. The side event integrated seamlessly into MIGF's broader vision, highlighting UA as a cross-cutting enabler for digital equality, economic opportunity, and social inclusion.

Organizers underscored that ongoing collaboration among government institutions, technical experts, academia, and international partners is vital for continued UA implementation. This side event demonstrated Moldova's capacity to engage with global digital governance trends and make a meaningful contribution to a more inclusive and accessible internet for all. 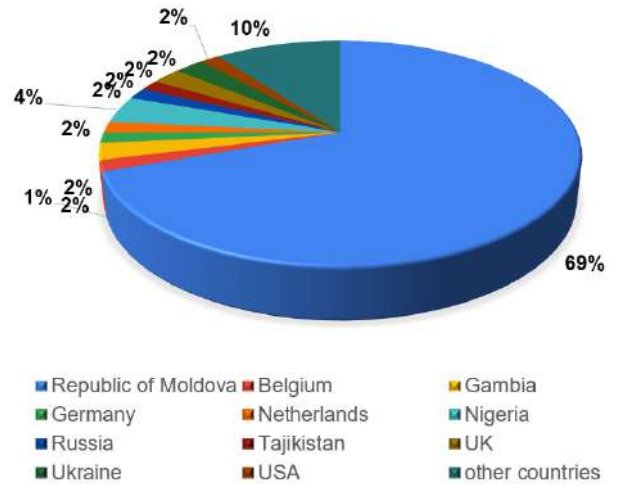

BREAKDOWN BY COUNTRY

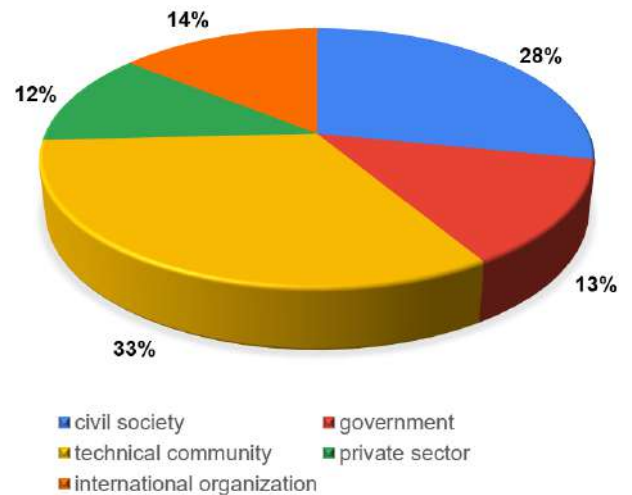
The Moldova Internet Governance Forum had a registration form, which had to be filled in and submitted before or during the event. MIGF 2025 was attended by 209 registered participants and contributors, most of them from the Republic of Moldova (69%). The geography of foreign participants covered the following countries in alphabetical order: Armenia, Belgium, Canada, Gambia, Georgia, Germany, India, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, the Netherlands, Nigeria, Poland, Romania, Russia, Singapore, Serbia, Tajikistan, Ukraine, the UK and the USA.



PARTICIPANTS OF THE FORUM ACCORDING TO THEIR AFFILIATION

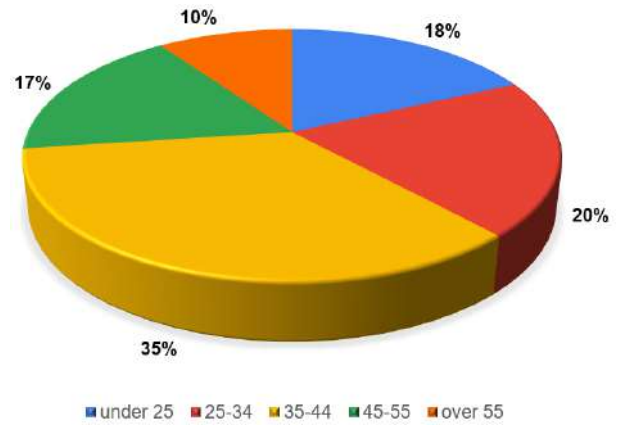

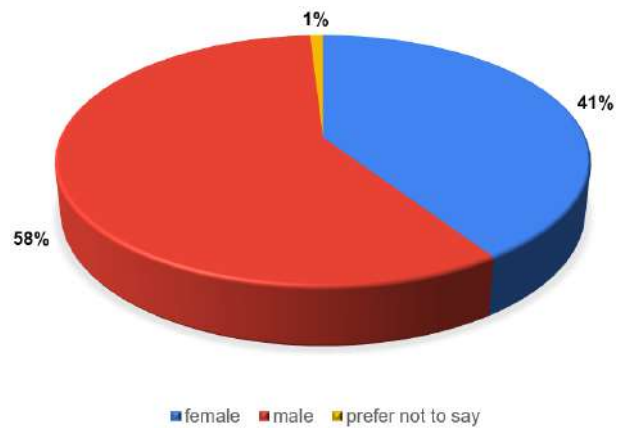
BREAKDOWN BY AGE

The most represented age group was 35-44 years old, which made up about a third of all participants (35%). This year, representatives of the younger generation were also actively involved in the IG process: 18% of participants were under 25 years old and 20% were aged 25-34 years. The least represented group was people aged 55 and older at 10% (this figure remained at the same level as last year).



BREAKDOWN BY GENDER REPRESENTATION

In regards to gender representation, men (58%) were prevalent at the Forum. The largest disproportion was recorded among the group of stakeholders representing the technical community, where women constituted 42%. This result may be explained by the fact that several Forum activities focused on technical topics, which attracted more male participants.

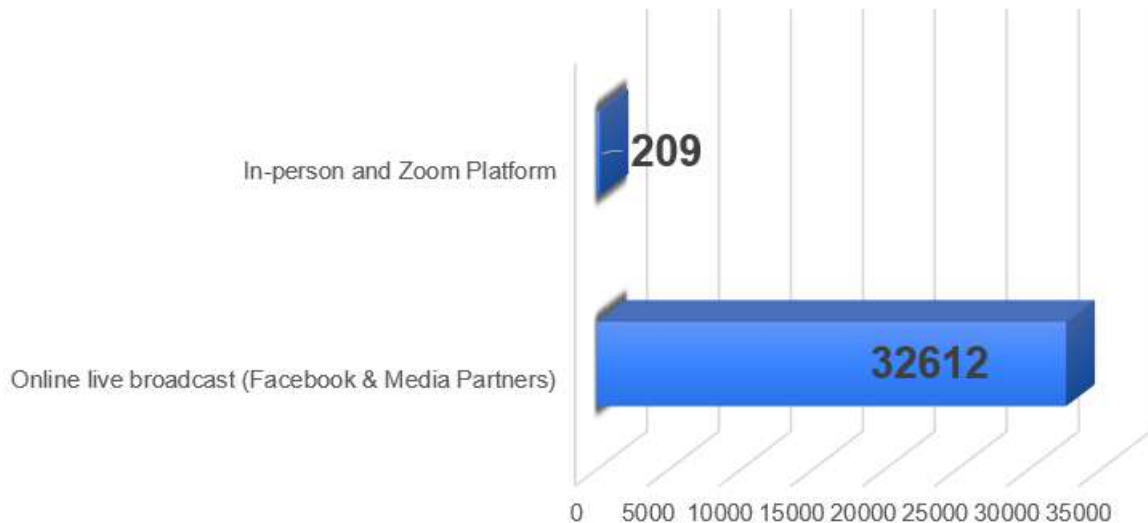

ATTENDANCE STATISTICS OF THE MEETING

During April 15–16, most of the Forum audience joined the event via live broadcasts on social media and online television. The event was streamed on both days through RLive TV, with national coverage, and TV Nord, which covers the northern region of Moldova. According to statistics from the Facebook platform and media partners, a total of **32,612 unique viewers** joined the live online broadcast. A total of **209 registered participants** attended the Forum sessions in person over the two days or connected via Zoom, which provided simultaneous interpretation in Romanian, Russian, and English.



FINANCIAL ISSUES



The necessary resources in the preparation and holding of the Forum were provided by the organizers, partners and sponsors of Moldova Internet Governance Forum. The meeting took place in a low-cost manner, having received in-kind and/or financial support from international organizations, public institutions, national partners of the event, as well as the organizing team and the wider community. No payment has been provided for any speakers.

Organizational activities may be divided into the following groups:

- The preparatory works (meetings of the organizing team and members of the Organizing Committee and Program Committee, arrangement of venues, preparation and sending of invitations, printing of the program, consultations with other supporters, etc.);
- Website development and maintenance, hosting, and other related activities (payment for the domain, updating and administration of website and social networks pages);
- Designing conception of the event and branding related activities (creation and integration of Forum visuals and other printing materials, conducting surveys among the members of the community, roll-up 80x200, banner 4000x2500, logo, badge, program markup, etc.);
- Online promotion (web banners, news and social media), the development of informational materials, as well as outreach activities targeting the broader community of the country;
- Organizational space preparatory works (search and selection of space, conference hall, technical equipment, etc.);
- Rent of the technical equipment for Zoom sessions support and moderation, online platform settings, testing and event online platform technical support;
- Conference simultaneous interpreting and Interpretation facilities (in 3 languages – Romanian, Russian, English);
- Catering and coffee breaks during the two days of the event;
- Printing activities (search and selection of printing company, badges, event agenda, banners and roll-ups);
- Media support and broadcast of the event (video and photo shooting over two days, all sessions, online broadcasting, live streaming, TV video preparations, preparation of announcements, and media coverage of the event);
- Forum online and technical support (web-page administration, social media support live stream, web-site hosting, audience interaction, online engagement support);
- Accountant and logistics management, report layout and editing and other organizational expenses.

MEDIA COVERAGE



The fifth Moldova IGF was widely covered by both traditional media and social media channels, reflecting the sustained interest in Internet governance topics. Most of the coverage was presented in Romanian and Russian, with some sources also providing information in English. To ensure broad and inclusive outreach across different regions of the country, the media coverage involved audiovisual, online, and print media with both national and regional reach — including outlets popular in the northern and southern parts of Moldova.

The 16th Moldova Internet Governance Forum (MIGF) 2025 will be held in Chisinau on April 15 and 16. It will be a platform for dialog between digital stakeholders and international partners.



The event will be held in a hybrid format – participation is possible both offline in Chisinau and online. The program covers such areas as digital trust, transborder online information environment, cybersecurity and digital rights. It will also discuss the role of digital technologies in the context of geopolitical instability and complex threats, including cybersecurity and protection of user's rights in digital spaces.

Vice President of ICANN Corporation Matt Mackenzie will present the keynote speech, which aims to provide an overview of some international initiatives on digital governance. The Global Digital Impact, adopted at the UN Summit of the Future in September 2024 in New York, will be in the spotlight. The speaker will discuss why it is important for countries and regions to participate in global digital policymaking and how this can affect the development of national digital ecosystems.

The Internet Governance Forum is a UN platform for discussing key digital policy issues in Moldova. The forum is organized by the Association "I am online Internet" with the participation of national and international partners: global players such as UCLouvain, Swiss Post, Vodafone, ARCEP, 19 and Access Now have joined them in 2025. At the local level, the participation is supported by the Agency for Electronic Communications and Information Technology (ANECIT) and the Information Technology and Cyber Security Service (ITSCS).

A separate event within MIGF 2025 will be Universal Acceptance Day (UAD), which will be held for the first time in Moldova on April 16. The event is organized with the support of ICANN and UADNET and is dedicated to multilingual, accessible and digital content, and the use of national domain names. UAD is part of a global mission of ensuring that internet services correctly recognize addresses and domains in all languages and alphabets.

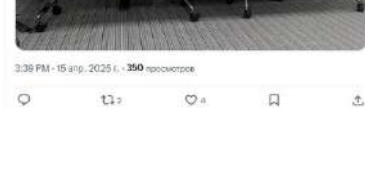
