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## Introduction

The **Latin American and Caribbean Internet Governance Forum** is a multi-sectoral process focused on Internet governance and digital policy issues from a regional perspective.

Since 2008, a total of 17 meetings have been held annually in countries such as Uruguay, Brazil, Ecuador, Trinidad and Tobago, Colombia, Argentina, El Salvador, Mexico, Costa Rica, Panama, Bolivia and Chile.

The 17th edition of the Latin American and Caribbean Internet Governance Forum (LACIGF) was held in Santiago de Chile on 7 and 8 November 2024 at the Telefónica Building.

This edition of the Forum had many novelties, since, in accordance with the mandate of the new LACIGF statutes, in addition to a call to propose relevant topics for discussion, for the first time there was a Workshop Selection Committee and a call to propose sessions by the community.

This report compiles the highlights of the annual event.

## Mission and objective

The LACIGF is a multi-stakeholder initiative focused on internet governance and digital policy issues from a regional perspective created in 2008.

Its mission is to provide a space for open policy dialogue on the issues of its scope, where all stakeholders participate on an equal footing without any kind of discrimination and, where possible, produce high-level agreements through consensus for the identification of public policy recommendations and collaborative strategies.

Discussions at the LACIGF include the analysis of emerging issues, the identification of priority issues for the region, the consideration of policy options to address issues related to the use and growth of the Internet as a tool for human, social and economic development, and the contribution of Latin American and Caribbean perspectives in other regional and international spaces

## Structure of the LACIGF

The structure of the LACIGF is composed of four bodies:

1. The Multi-Stakeholder Committee (MSC)
2. The Workshop Selection Committee (TSC)
3. The Intersessional Working Groups (IWGs)
4. The Secretariat

The stakeholders that are represented in the Committees are:

## Multi-Stakeholder Committee

The Multi-Stakeholder Committee, formerly known as the Programme Committee, is responsible for the strategic and operational direction of the mechanisms that make up the LACIGF and for ensuring the smooth functioning and fulfilment of its mission.

This committee is composed of individuals nominated by each of the above-mentioned stakeholder groups. Each sector plans its own course of action and selects its representatives according to its own criteria.

CMPI meets every 15 days throughout the year.

## Workshop Selection Committee

The Workshop Selection Committee (CST) is responsible for the selection of the workshops that take place each year as part of the agenda of the annual LACIGF event.

This committee arises from the statutes defined in 2021 and is formed for the first time in 2024 after an open call from which a diverse, multi-sectoral group of different nationalities is defined.

The CST is composed of 12 persons, 3 from each of the above-mentioned sectors, who were selected by the Multi Stakeholder Committee taking into account criteria such as experience and geographical, multi-sectoral and gender diversity.

A total of 74 people from 20 countries in Latin America and the Caribbean participated in the call for the formation of the CST. The selection process resulted in the following conformation of the Workshop Selection Committee for the year 2024.

Since its formation, the CST has met fortnightly throughout the year, with some extraordinary meetings during the evaluation period of sessions.

## Intersessional working groups

The intersessional working groups constitute the core of the intersessional spaces of the LACIGF and their conformation was defined in the 2021 statutes.

Each IWG should be presented by at least 2 different sectors, and will have at least 2 co-coordinators representing two different sectors as leadership figures. These groups are expected to be formed from 2025 onwards.

## Secretariat

In the year 2023 an open call was made for organisations interested in taking on the role of LACIGF Secretariat. After a transparent process, the Colnodo Association - [www.colnodo.apc.org](http://www.colnodo.apc.org) was selected to assume this role as of July 2023, a role that from the beginning of LACIGF until June of that year had been carried out by LACNIC - [www.lacnic.net](http://www.lacnic.net).

# Preparing the forum

## Definition of themes

For the definition of themes, an open consultation with the community of the region was held from 1 to 26 February 2024, in which 91 responses were received from 18 Latin American countries, which prioritised among the themes already proposed and suggested new themes in an open manner.

The selected themes were:

- AI and Emerging Technologies
- Human Rights
- Cybersecurity
- Universal Access and Meaningful Connectivity
- Digital Governance and Cooperation
- Environment and sustainability
- Education and digital literacy
- Gender and diversity
- Ethical and legal challenges

## Definition of the country and local partners of the event

For the definition of the country where the event would be held, the proposals received in the call for country applications in 2019 were taken into account, in which Bolivia was selected for the 2019 event and Colombia and Chile were pre-selected for the following year. Given that during the years 2020 to 2022, the event was held online, from 2023 onwards the proposals received are taken up and updated, contacting the proposing organisations to validate interest and request a budget update.

In January 2024, contact was resumed with the Chilean organisations that had submitted the original proposal and it was agreed to work collectively to hold the event in Santiago de Chile in November.

## Call for sessions

In 2024, for the first time, the LACIGF had sessions proposed by the Latin American and Caribbean community through an open call.

Since its creation, the CST met fortnightly to define the criteria for the call for session proposals for the annual edition of the forum, as well as to establish the evaluation mechanism, which was published on the LACIGF website together with the application form.

The call for session proposals was open from 17 July to 21 August 2024. By the time the call for proposals closed, 99 proposals had been registered for all the topics proposed. However, some of the themes had the highest participation, such as: Artificial Intelligence with 23 proposals, Digital Governance and Cooperation with 19 and Human Rights with 17.

Civil society and academia were the sectors with the highest number of proposers, followed closely by the technical community. The proponents and co-proponents come from 11 countries in Latin America and the Caribbean, without taking into account the different nationalities of the people registered as facilitators and speakers in the workshops.

After a detailed review and evaluation process, a total of 18 sessions were selected by the Workshop Selection Committee to form the agenda of the 17th LACIGF.

## Realisation of the event

### Date and place of the event

The 17th edition of LACIGF took place at the Telefónica building in Santiago de Chile, Chile, on 7 and 8 November 2024.

### Agenda

The event took place in a hybrid format, face-to-face and virtual, with twenty-two (22) sessions on the topics prioritised by the community, eighteen (18) parallel sessions proposed through an open call and four (4) plenary sessions proposed by the CMPI considering the topics of greatest interest to the internet community in the region.

Around 120 people participated in the sessions as panellists, moderators, proposers, co-proponents and presenters and virtual rapporteurs.

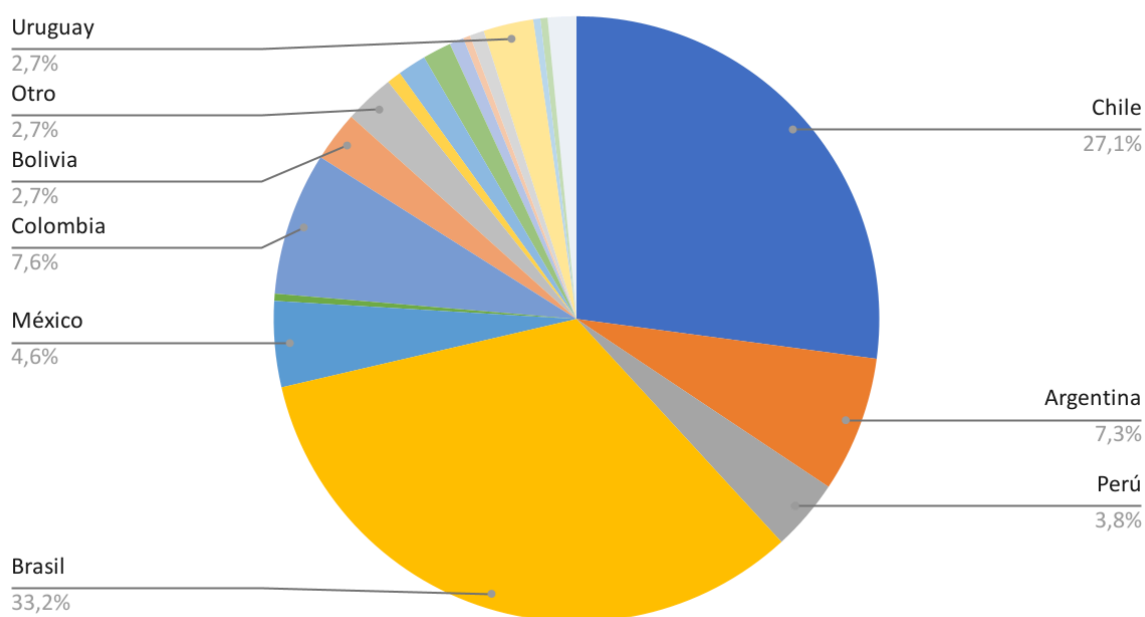

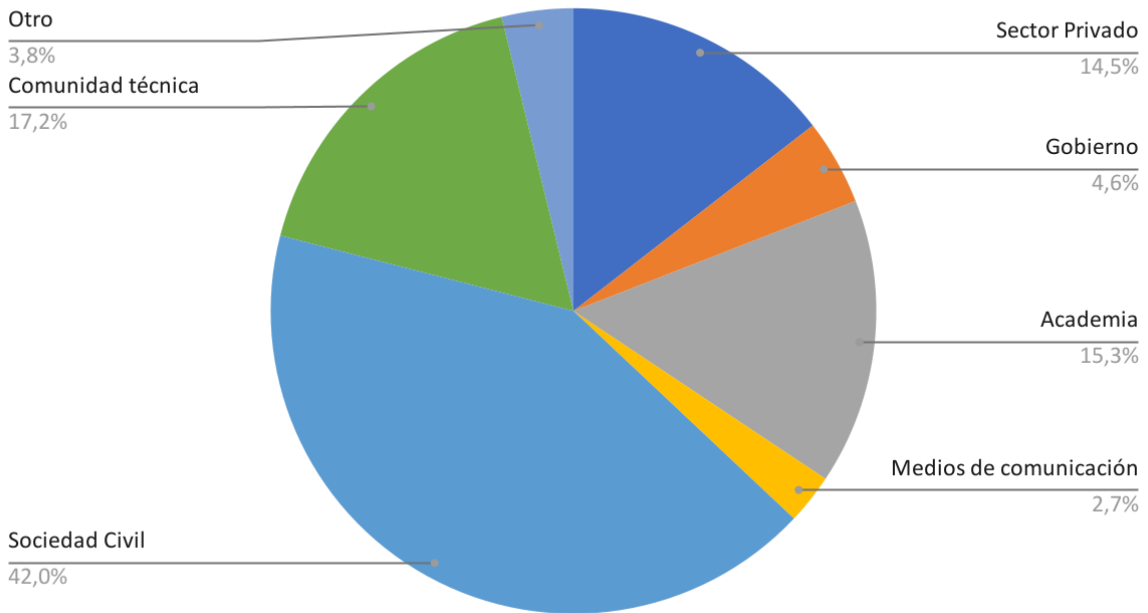

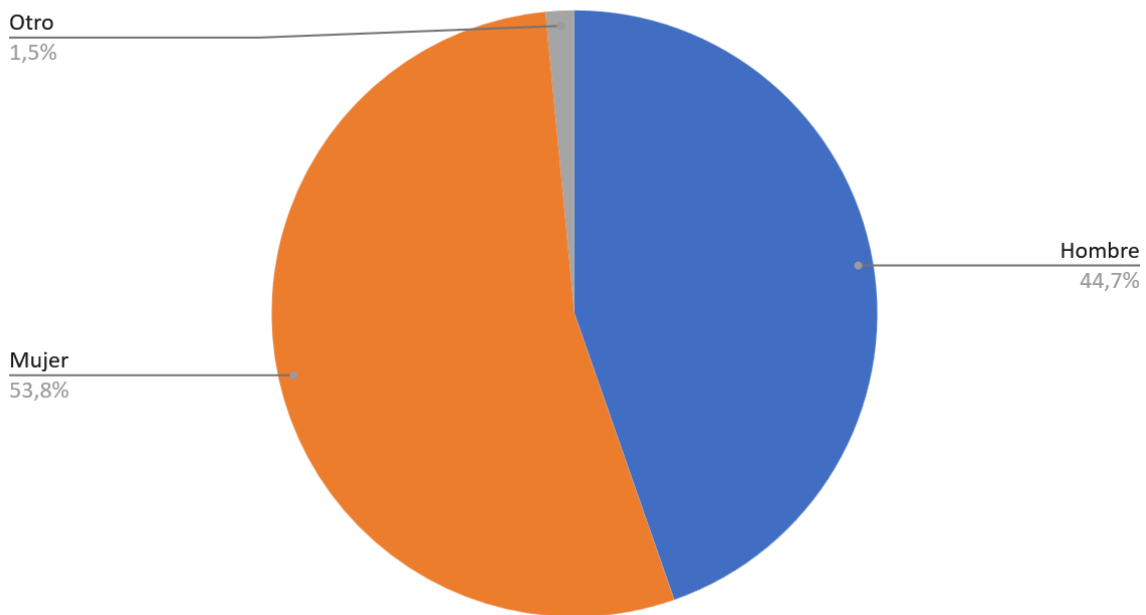

## Scholarships

An open call for applications was made and 104 people applied, from which a total of 12 scholarships were allocated directly from LACIGF resources. Most of the scholarships requested were for air tickets and only one was for hotel accommodation.
