GLOBAL AGENDA AND GLOBAL GOOD PRACTICES



About the Global Forum on Cyber Expertise

The Global Forum on Cyber Expertise (GFCE) was launched at the Global Conference on Cyberspace of 2015 in The Hague by 42 Ministers and other high level representatives from businesses and international organizations. The GFCE is a global platform for countries, international organizations and private companies to exchange best practices and expertise on cyber capacity building. Together with partners from NGOs, the tech community and academia, GFCE members develop practical initiatives to build cyber capacity. The core objective of the GFCE is to identify successful policies, practices and ideas, and to multiply these on a global level.

What is the Global Agenda?

The GFCE has initiated the process for developing the Global Agenda on Cyber Capacity Building (GACCB). The primary objective of the GACCB is to identify global priorities in the field of Cyber Capacity Building, to be presented at the GCCS2017 in India.

What are Global Good Practices?

Global Good Practices (GGPs) are defined as practices that are recognized by experts in the field, proven to work and applicable for the global community. Towards the GCCS2017 the GFCE community will develop several Global Good Practices.


Towards the GCCS 2017

The aim of the GFCE is to bring both the GGPs and the GACCB to the Global Conference on Cyber Space (GCCS) in New Delhi on 23-24 November 2017. Below, this process is visualised.

With regards to the GGPs, the first step in the process was to identify them based on the existing expertise and methods within initiatives. The next step is to consult the broad GFCE community of countries, international organizations, companies and academia. The results will be presented at the GCCS, which will provide an opportunity to build more support.

With regards to the GACCB, the first step included desk research. Based on analysis of a wide collection of national and international cyber strategy documents, The Netherlands Organisation for Applied Scientific Research (TNO) had prepared a list of potential topics of interest for a workshop during the GFCE Annual Meeting May 31st 2017. This list provided a comprehensive overview of global topics of interest as set forth by governments, international organisations and private companies. The next step is to consult the broad GFCE community and the GCCS community. Finally the goal is to present the final agenda at the GCCS2017, including ambitions for the future.
